Welcome back to 2024

We are very excited to inform our community that our school has partnered with Latrobe University to implement the Science of Reading. The ability to read proficiently is fundamental to a student's success at school and in later life. The Science of Reading provides the strongest evidence about how young children learn to read. Understanding the cognitive science behind how students learn to read and the research on effective instruction makes it easier for teachers to align classroom teaching with evidence. Cognitive science explains how the brain learns skills that are not innate or 'biologically primary'. Speaking is a biologically primary skill that humans 'pick up' naturally, whereas reading, while closely associated with speaking, is primarily a cultural invention of the last 6,000 years, which requires repetition and external motivation to be mastered. When a child is taught how to read, neural pathways that have evolved to specialise in language and visual recognition are re-purposed for the process of reading and writing. Reading must be explicitly and systematically taught in a structured way.

The Science of Reading refers to a body of evidence that includes multi-disciplinary knowledge from education, linguistics, cognitive psychology, special education and neuroscience. The Science of Reading looks at the essential cognitive processes for competent reading and describes how reading develops in readers. These studies have revealed a great deal about how we learn to read, what goes wrong when students don't learn, and the instructional strategies that are required for reading.

We will be offering some parent information sessions during this term so that everyone in our community has a better understanding of how we are teaching the students, especially in the area of English. MACS has also embarked on this research and schools are also beginning to use this methodology to teach Mathematics. Hence, the testing in English (EOI) and Maths (MOI) undertaken in the first two days of school this year. As both these assessments were very lengthy and involved, some of the students have needed to complete these over this week and possibly next week as well.

Opening of the Year Mass

Yesterday we gathered as a whole school to celebrate Mass to mark the beginning of the school year. It was wonderful to have our whole community together once again. Our teachers were commissioned at this Mass and all classroom prayer cloths blessed. We hope that everyone has a wonderful year in 2024.

School Assembly

School Assemblies this year will be held every alternate Monday, where practical. The next school assembly for the year will be held on Monday 12th February at 2.40pm in the hall. Year 2S is presenting and celebrating their learning. At each assembly a class presents some aspects of their learning. Student of the Week awards are presented to students who demonstrate one or more of our school expectations. Parents are warmly welcome to attend.

Learning Conversations

Our Learning Conversations will be held on Monday 19th February from 8.30am and conclude at 5.30pm. These conversations are a wonderful opportunity to support the children as they begin their new year of learning. Through establishing positive relationships between school and home the children feel supported and know that everyone understands their needs. Please ensure that you have booked a time to meet with your child(ren)'s teacher. There is opportunity for both online and face to face to accommodate all families. We expect that the children will be present during these meetings. Please note, that due to the Learning Conversations, the children are not required at school.

Booking a time for Learning Conversations

In response to the parent survey from last year, our school now has a new communication platform called COMPASS. Through this platform, parents will receive all communication as well as communicate with the school, book for various events including meetings and learning conversations, advice of student absences, fill permission and medical forms, etc. In essence, everything will happen through this APP so that it is streamlined. Parents are asked to please ensure you have downloaded the COMPASS APP. If unsure please contact the school office and you will be guided. The Learning Conversation times will be booked on COMPASS, so please book via the 'Conference' tab or icon. As we are all becoming used to using this new APP I'm sure there will be some teething problems. We will work together as we all learn how to use this new platform.

Ash Wednesday

The Liturgical Season of Lent this year begins with Ash Wednesday next Wednesday 14th February. Lent marks for us as Christians a time to prepare for Easter. On Ash Wednesday, we are marked with the cross to remind us that we are

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embarking on the 40 days of prayer, repentance and alms giving. This ends on Holy Thursday when the Season of Easter begins. This Lenten period allows us a time for self-discipline as we prepare for Easter, which is considered the holiest day of the year commemorating Jesus' resurrection. Lent for us also replicates Jesus' sacrifice in the desert and his avoidance of temptation during those 40 days. Therefore in this period we try to abstain from luxuries and commit to fasting and prayer as a way to focus ourselves on the true importance of this time. As a whole school, we will be attending the Parish Mass at 9.15 am. Families are welcome to join with us.

School Hats

St Damian's school is a Sunsmart school. This means that we expect all our students and staff to be wearing hats when outside during high UV periods, mainly in Term 1 and Term 4. Therefore, we ask all parents to ensure that your child(ren) have their **school hat** to wear when at school. *Australia* has one of the highest rates of *skin cancer* in the world. Anyone can be at risk of developing *skin cancer*. The majority of *skin cancers* in *Australia* are caused by exposure to UV radiation in sunlight. Hence our school policy: **NO HAT NO PLAY**

School Uniform

It is an expectation that students wear the correct school uniform at all times. This includes wearing school shoes, not black runners. School shoes should be **plain black leather**, which is much healthier for growing feet. Runners (whatever colour) should only be worn on sport days with school sport uniform. We also ask that students **do not** wear jewellery to school as this can easily be lost and can cause distress to both students and families. Only sleepers or stud earrings should be worn as a safety precaution. NO dangly earrings, nail polish or other accessories to be worn with the uniform, this includes hair accessories please. Also, please ensure that hair that is longer than shoulder length is tied back.

Car parking

Just a reminder that the front carpark is not a drop off zone. Please note that the carpark gates close between 8.30am and 8.45am and again between 3.15pm and 3.30pm. to allow a buffer period of safety whilst the students are entering or leaving the school premises. Parents are not allowed to open or close gates, this is the responsibility of the staff on duty. Working together in this ensures that everyone is kept safe at all times. Thank you for understanding.

Kiss & Drop & Parking

Thank you to all our parents for using the Kiss and Drop safely. Just to refresh procedures. This area is a drop off area only, drivers do not get out of the car for any purpose. Students alight from cars on the opposite side to the driver and walk quickly to the footpath. Staff are on duty to supervise the students to ensure everyone's safety. Parents cannot park in the school, the side area near the playground is for staff parking only.

School Advisory Council

I wish to advise that the first School Advisory Council meeting for 2024 will be held on Tuesday 12th March at 7.30pm. The role of the SAC is to provide advice and guidance to the school and support the school's initiatives and directions. School Advisory Council is not a representative body, its role is purely advisory. We are able to accommodate an extra member if a parent is keen to join. Membership is not onerous as we meet six (6) times a year, usually in the evening, for around 1.5 hours. The previous members of the SAC are continuing in their roles for 2024.

I would like to invite all in our community to come and join together in an informal way and meet one another.
